FAITH: I think **Fresh Expressions** and **Bishop's Mission Orders** are a significant positive supplement to parish ministry. It is important to increase the level of care for clergy as they work in the community on the front line. We need to think sensibly about pension provision and not undervalue clergy.

HOPE: The Church of England maybe declining in national influence and membership in recent years. But, Jesus longs to build his Church. The National Church needs to address falling numbers, finances, moral and the overstretching of its ministry. It is time to examine our values, mission and priorities. With the right leadership, the circumstances facing the church are an opportunity for us to re-focus on our primary tasks.

LOVE: I will encourage building flexibility into our mission initiatives and support the aspiration of spiritual and numerical growth.

I will support investment to raise standards of excellence in ordained ministry and back vocations for the pastoral ministry.

I will promote the need to communicate what the Church is about, both to our own household of faith and into the wider community.

I will back the traditional view of marriage as we report back on Living in Love and Faith. I will continue to listen to all sides of the human sexuality debate continuing to demonstrate pastoral sensitivity and love.

I will back the imaginative deployment of clergy so as to allow local mission and ministry to flourish in town and country.

The Big Challenges:

Money, Staffing, Sexuality, Mission & Unity

General Synod will need **Faith, Hope and Love** as we face the massive challenges over how we finance ministry into the next decade. The Synod still needs to work on the simplification of Church life and continue the good work of safeguarding and the five guiding principles. A priority will also be vocations (both young and old) along with support for good theological training. I am concerned for the wider Anglican Communion and our links with South Sudan. Our aim should be to build greater unity in the gospel as expressed in our Anglican identity. I believe those elected should work for unity as we seek the glory of God.

During the next five years, major decisions will be made on the priority of mission and ministry, human sexuality, balancing the need between ministry and financial resources. I will speak up for the ordinary clergy of the diocese whether in the town or county. I will support the new Bishop to find resources to help the work of ministry in the diocese. My concern will be to represent ALL clergy in the many matters which impact us and our ministry in the Church.
